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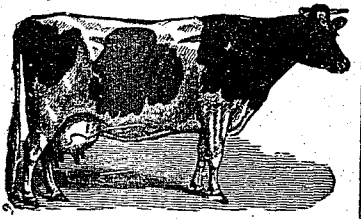

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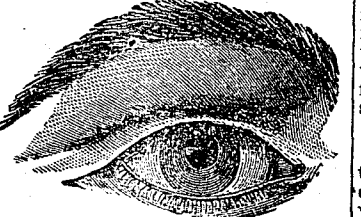

Plymouth County Bar Enjoins One of Its Deceased Members  
The Bar association of Plymouth County held a meeting at the court room on Monday afternoon in memory of Hon. Isaac S. Struble, long a member of this bar. Resolutions were presented and which were adopted, and the secretary was instructed to forward a copy to the family of the deceased brother. Attorney J. S. Lothrop, of Sioux City, was present and made feeling remarks voicing his personal loss and sorrow and testifying to the high character and many good qualities of his departed friend. Judge W. D. Boles and Attorneys McDuffie and Roseberry also made appropriate remarks. The resolutions adopted are as follows:

The committee appointed by the Bar Association of Plymouth County, Iowa, submit the following:  
On the 17th day of February, 1913 Isaac S. Struble died at his home in LeMars, Iowa, in the 70th year of his age. He came to LeMars as a young man forty-one years ago, and has been an honored member of the bar of Plymouth county during all of said time, and engaged in active practice, except while serving as Congressman from this district.

He was first elected to Congress in 1882 and he served eight years, making an enviable record as an able, industrious and conscientious representative of the people of this district. Four of the years of his early manhood he gave to the service of his country as a soldier in the ranks, and his interest in the comfort and welfare of all old soldiers was always keen. In politics he was Republican, of the unequalled type, and he always took an active part in the interest of the party he helped to create. He was deeply religious, a lifelong member of the Congregational church, and for the last thirty years was much of the time superintendent of its Sunday School. He was public spirited and interested and ready to help any enterprise looking to the public good. As a citizen and neighbor his never failing courtesy and kindness won him a warm place in the hearts of all who knew him.

Whereas, the hand of death was laid upon him while manfully doing his daily task, and when many years of usefulness appeared to be before him;

Be it resolved, by the members of the Bar Association of Plymouth county, Iowa, assembled in the court room in said county this 5th day of May, 1913, that in the death of the Hon. Isaac S. Struble, the bar of Plymouth county has lost an honored, active and able member, tireless in his loyalty to his client, but ever respectful and courteous to his associates and to the court; that to these qualities as a lawyer he united a genial, open and kindly nature that endeared him to all who came to know him; that justice and right have lost a valiant friend and the state and this community has lost a valued citizen.

Resolved: That the District Court of this county be requested to order these resolutions to be spread upon the records of said county and that the secretary of the association be instructed to send a copy thereof to the family of our deceased brother, with the profound sympathy of the members of the bar.

And always it was raised upon

Of those who fought with him, and those  
Who died to free the land of slaves,

And yet to all both bench and bar  
He was most kind and courteous.

On memory's page the epithet  
As having been an advocate

He was a Christian gentleman.

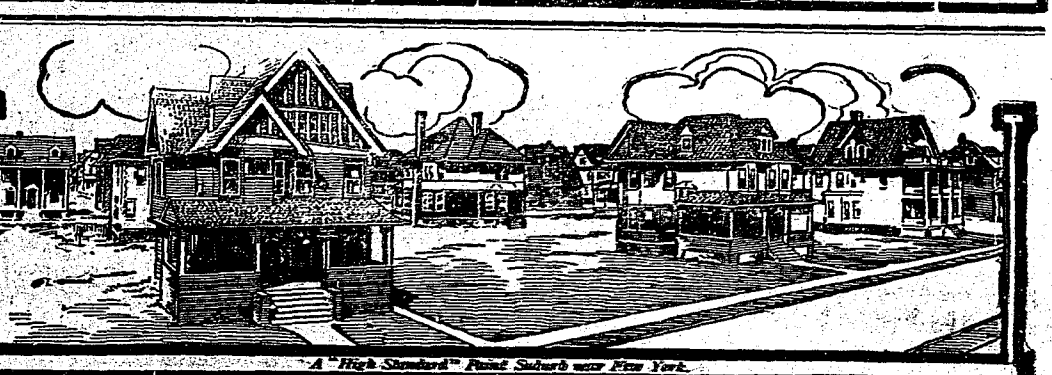
